

SIR LLOYD GEERING AT ST MICHAEL'S

Sir Lloyd Geering is a courageous and controversial theological commentator. His proposal of an overhaul of the Christian Faith in the 1970s saw him tried as a heretic and acquitted. He was professor of Religious Studies at Victoria University of Wellington, New Zealand and has written a number of provocative books including *Christianity Without God*, his autobiographical *Wrestling With God* and his latest, *Coming Back to Earth*. He continues to be a leading voice in the International Scholars of the Jesus Seminar.

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LETTER FROM THE JOHN WATERS SCHOLAR

The 2010 recipient for the John Waters Scholarship has begun his studies at the Cairnmillar Institute and placement at Mingary Counselling Service. Already he has helped at the first SAGE event of the year and KFOG. Here, he writes about his work in Colombia and what he hopes to find in his experience at Cairnmillar and in Australia.

My name is Camilo Martinez, and I am a 26 year old psychologist from Colombia in South America.

My questions and passion for understanding social and individual behaviour started around ten years ago when I was still at school, volunteering with an NGO working with homeless children. At the same time I worked in the church of

my school doing activities and supporting groups of displaced people in my country. As a result, I think that at that early age I started to empower others and myself, through strengthening the psychosocial resources of these vulnerable communities.

From then on, I have been working, as a psychologist or volunteering its for more than six years with victims


of sexual abuse and domestic violence. These people were mainly victims of socio-political violence; victims of forced displacement, victims of torture, families of missing persons, families of massacred persons; in general, different types of persons who have been severely traumatised and have experienced post-traumatic stress disorders and other different emotional disorders as a result of the multiple losses and

difficult experiences that they have lived.

From these experiences, I realized that I needed to improve my psychotherapeutic skills in order to give better support to these people who are suffering because of

the war and their poverty resulting in a lot of unmet needs all over the population.

In the future, with the help of the Cairnmillar Institute education, I dream of running a human rights foundation for people traumatized because of the different forms of violence, wishing to help them to cope better with their lives and to empower new forms of building social justice and peace.


