there will be a traditional Cambodia dance demonstration and a chance to sample Cambodian finger food. Don't miss a chance to be a part of something different. The Khmer

Angkor Dance Group founded by Ms Sovandeth Hay who trained at the royal palace in Phnom Penh, is bound to impress. The grace of the elegant hand movements and elaborate costumes of this classical Cambodian dance style is remarkable.

For an afternoon of performance, St Michael's is the place to be on Sunday 16 May. A mix of Cambodian dance and food followed by a world class choral performance and an opportunity to give to a good cause.

COMMON DREAMS 2 CONFERENCE

The Common Dreams 2 Conference was held from 15 – 19 April, drew people together "from many parts of the world to explore progressive religion.

Attending the event was St Michael's member Simon McCall who wrote about the experience.

"I, along with around 500 others (including other St Michael's people) attended the second *Common Dreams Conference* held at St Kilda Town Hall this year. The eminent Keynote Speakers, included St Michael's Dr Francis Macnab and other theologians from all over the world: Rev Gretta Vosper of the United Church of Canada, Rev Dr Margaret Mayman of the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa, New Zealand; Dr Val Webb; Rabbi Aviva Kipen a female

Rabbi in the Progressive Jewish World; Sherene Hassan Vice-President of the Islamic Council of Victoria; Father Peter Kennedy of St Mary's in Exile Brisbane and Sir Lloyd Geering.

Proceedings commenced on the Thursday night with the Inaugural Francis Macnab Progressive Religion Lecture: *The Challenge Progressive Thinking is Making to the Church* by Gretta Vosper, and the next day the Conference was opened by Professor Gary Bouma, chair of the recent *Parliament of World Religions*.

There were many stimulating talks, some with pleasant surprises - Multi-Media presentations and even music. Gretta Vosper sang during hers (I guess if your Minister can sing

well it lessens the need for a Choir)!

Dr Macnab gave his lecture Saturday morning on the "New Faith" that's Needed and the "New Faith" that's not Wanted. This was then followed with a lively half hour 'mini witness box' a question and answer session, opened to the floor.

Personal favourites of mine were the talks by Fr Kennedy, Dr Val Webb and Dr Margaret Mayman."

DYING WITH DIGNITY

The right to die with dignity has been a much discussed topic at St Michael's over April and May. We've seen rallies, Sunday services and discussion groups delve into this controversial topic.

It's an issue Dr Francis Macnab feels strongly about: you have a choice about how you can live your life but cannot choose how you die. In his experience as a psychotherapist he has seen people suffering, wishing to die, with dignity, but having these wishes denied when the time came.

He joined members and supporters of *Dying with Dignity Victoria* on the steps of Parliament house, Melbourne for the fourth annual Steve Guest Day Rally on Wednesday 14 April, representing the 85%

Australians who agree that it is time for a law reform that allows people to die with dignity.

On Sunday 11 April, Dr Macnab's address Look for a Good Life. Decide

a Dignified Death gave us food for thought. second address ...More on Dying with Dignity. How we Choose to live. How we Choose to Die followed 85% Sunday on May. 2 Both

services were attended by many members of *Dying with Dignity Victoria* including Rodney Symes, former president of the organisation and one of the seven distinguished speakers at the rally in April.

The conversation was continued at a post service discussion chaired by Dr Macnab. Large numbers crowded

into the Waratah room to discuss this forefront topic.

The debate continues and so too does Dr Macnab's support.


