

WELCOME & ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF COUNTRY REV DR MARGARET MAYMAN

Welcome to this online gathering.

I'm Margaret Mayman, minister at St Michael's Uniting Church in Melbourne.

Wherever you have come from, wherever you are going to;
whatever you believe, whatever you do not believe;
you are welcome.

We begin our worship, acknowledging Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who have dwelled in this land since time before dreaming.

At St Michael's we acknowledge the Wurundjeri people of the Kulin Nation, on whose land this church was built.

We acknowledge that land was taken from Indigenous people without their consent, treaty or compensation.

We honour the elders of the Wurundjeri people, past, present and emerging, and join with them, in hope for justice and reconciliation.

I invite you to acknowledge the First Peoples, on whose land you live.

A warm greeting to you, St Michael's members and friends, to you our community online companions, and especially to you who checking out St Michael's and joining us for the first time.

At St Michael's online we are gathering, connecting, nurturing our spirits in these anxious times. We come recognising the distress in personal and collective lives. We bring the spiritual tradition of Christian faith, the wisdom of other spiritual paths, the insights of poets, and the glories of music into dialogue with the realities of our lives, seeking companionship and beauty so that in company with the Sacred and each other, we may live well for ourselves, our communities, our social and ecological worlds.

In this gathering today we reflect on work – paid or unpaid, recognised or unrecognised, remunerated or exploited. Work that is part of our identity but experienced differently. We will hear the parable of the labourers in the vineyard and a contemporary poem that draws us to reflect on the trust we place in people whose work is caring and healing.

I also want to foreshadow next week's gathering – the celebration of St Michael's Day, an annual ritual for our community. This year it will be different, but we will still celebrate in a focus on "our stories, our spirit, our strength".

LISTENING FOR SPIRIT

GOSPEL: MATTHEW 20: 1-16

IAN COX

'For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire labourers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the labourers for the usual daily wage, the landowner sent them into the vineyard.

When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the market-place; and he said to them, "You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right." So they went.

When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same.

And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, "Why are you standing here idle all day?" They said to him, "Because no one has hired us." He said to them, "You also go into the vineyard."

When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, "Call the labourers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first."

When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, "These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat."

But he replied to one of them, "Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?" So the last will be first, and the first will be last.'

MUSIC FOR REFLECTION

Ave Maria - J.S. Bach (1685-1750) and Charles Gounod (1818-1893)

This intriguing work, by two composers who never met, and whose lives did not even overlap, dates from 1853. The accompaniment part, is actually a prelude by the German master, Johann Sebastian Bach, whilst the melody, written some 137 years after the accompaniment, is by one of the great operatic composers of the 19th century, Charles Gounod. Like many works, the words *Ave Maria* were given to it, as they are easy to set and carried great appeal in largely Roman Catholic 19th Century Paris. Gounod originally published the work as 'Méditation sur le Premier Prélude de Piano de S. Bach'.

UK born violinist Helen Bower studied at Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance in London, and upon graduation was awarded the Vivian Prindl Outreach Prize for her music/dance collaboration In the Loop.
