From Richard Rohr, Everything Belongs: The Gift of Contemplative Prayer


“The people who know God well—mystics, hermits, prayerful people, those who risk everything to find God—always meet a lover, not a dictator.”

“Try to say that: “I don't know anything”. We used to call it “tabula rasa” in Latin. Maybe you could think of yourself as an erased blackboard, ready to be written on. For by and large, what blocks spiritual teaching is the assumption that we already know, or that we don't need to know. We have to pray for the grace of beginner's mind. We need to say with the blind man, “I want to see.”

“God is always bigger than the boxes we build for God, so we should not waste too much time protecting the boxes.”

“In terms of soul work, we dare not get rid of the pain before we have learned what it has to teach us.”

“Our first experience of life is primarily felt in the *body.* ... We know ourselves in the security of those who hold us and gaze upon us. It's not heard or seen or thought it's felt. That's the original knowing.”

GATHERING AS PEOPLE OF EARTH AND SPIRIT

WELCOME & ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF COUNTRY REV DR MARGARET MAYMAN

Welcome to this online gathering.

I'm Margaret Mayman, minister at St Michael's Uniting Church in Melbourne.

Wherever you have come from, wherever you are going to;
whatever you believe, whatever you do not believe;
you are welcome.

We begin our worship, acknowledging Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who have dwelled in this land since time before dreaming.

At St Michael's we acknowledge the Wurundjeri and Boon Wurrung peoples of the Kulin Nation, on whose land this church was built.

We acknowledge that land was taken from Indigenous people without their consent, treaty or compensation.

We honour the elders of the Wurundjeri people, past, present and emerging,

and join with them, in hope for justice and reconciliation.

I invite you to acknowledge the First Peoples, on whose land you live.

A warm welcome to you – to you who are members and friends of St Michael's, to you who have become part of St Michael's through joining in online Sunday gatherings during the coronavirus pandemic, and especially warm welcome to anyone who is joining us for the first time.

If you are joining in this online gathering from Melbourne on Sunday the 18th of October you will be very aware of the pending announcement of the next step in the road map to recovery. It's been a very long haul...and as I record this on Wednesday there is still no clarity about what the announcement will hold though there are strong hints that it may be possible to travel further to meet up with friends and family.

At the St Michael's Zoom cuppa last Sunday morning our conversation starter for the breakout rooms (with 6 to 8 people) was "what are you looking forward to when restrictions are eased." I realised as people talked what a difference it made to express the question in terms of our hopes rather than our losses. The question "what are you looking forward to" takes you to different places than the question "what are you missing." Our group heard several heart-felt hopes but my favourite was from the couple who are waiting to get to Bunnings so they can repaint their garden gate in the right shade of yellow. Bunnings featured in several stories. It was good to be able to laugh together.

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GUEST MUSICIAN

Amir Farid

Winner of the 2006 Australian National Piano Award, US born Iranian-Australian pianist Amir Farid has been described as “a highly creative musician – a pianist of great intelligence and integrity. He brings strong musical substance to all that he does, imbuing it with his own particular experience and understanding”, and who “in a well-populated field...distinguishes himself for all the right reasons”.

As one of the most versatile and loved musicians in Australia, the currently New York-based pianist has performed concerti with major orchestras, collaborating with conductors such as Christopher Hogwood, Oleg Caetani, Johannes Fritsch, Alexander Briger, Marko Letonja and Benjamin Northey. Highlights include Rachmaninoff’s 2nd piano concerto with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra in front of a 13,000-strong crowd at the Sidney Myer Music Bowl, Mozart’s concerto No.14 with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, and “The Mozart Dances” with the Mark Morris Dance Group and West Australian Symphony Orchestra as part of the 2015 Perth Festival.

Since graduating with distinction from the Royal College of Music London in 2009 with Andrew Ball, he has performed as a solo recitalist and collaborative artist in concert halls and festivals internationally, including Carnegie Hall New York, St. Martin in the Fields London, Mostly Mozart festival at Lincoln Center New York, Al-Hashemi-II Kuwait, MONA FOMA Festival Hobart, Coriole Festival SA, Huntington Festival NSW, as well as other venues in USA, Canada, Germany, Switzerland, New Zealand and China.
