

Prayer after communion


God of heaven and earth, you make us one in Christ.

Music Notes

"Blute Nur" from The St Matthew Passion BWV244 – J.S. Bach (1685-1750)

A man of great theological insight, Johann Sebastian Bach wrote his celebrated St Matthew Passion, an oratorio about the life of Jesus Christ in 1727.

This piece depicts the shedding of tears, and the comfort and consolation found in the life of Christ.

This song comes from Benjamin Britten's opera 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' which is a setting of the play by the same name written by Shakespeare. The opera was first performed in 1960.

Minuet Symphonique – Théodore-César Salomé (1834-1896)
