



Music Notes

'All Souls Day' – Richard Strauss (1864-1949)

Composed in 1885, the song 'All souls day' is a setting of a poem by Hermann von Gilm. This song is part of Strauss' collection of 8 songs known as 'Last Pages'. All Souls Day is the day which traditionally people remember all their loved ones who are no longer with us. Judith Dodsworth (Soprano) & Rhys Boak (Piano)

I know that my redeemer liveth – G.F. Handel (1685-1759) Handel's famous oratorio 'Messiah' needs little introduction. Dozens of performances of the work are performed in Melbourne alone each year by choirs. This aria is one of the most cherished, and is one of both great hope and also consolation.

Judith Dodsworth (Soprano) & Rhys Boak (Organ)

Nimrod from The Enigma Variations – Edward Elgar (1857-1934)
The Enigma Variations are amongst Elgar's earliest orchestral works.
Nimrod is the 9th of 14 variations. Elgar dedicated the piece to "my friends pictured within," and in the score each variation is prefaced with either a nickname or initials, a clue to the identity of the friend depicted. Nimrod is dedicated to Augustus J. Jaeger, Elgar's best friend. The name of the variation cleverly refers to Nimrod, the Old Testament patriarch who was described as a mighty Jaeger, the German word for hunter. This variation is famous in its own right and is a firm part of the organist's repertoire.
