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Music Notes

'When Heaven's bright with mystery' (Sussex Carol)

– English traditional melody arranged by David Willcocks (1919-2015) This traditional carol melody is of uncertain origin but was notated down by the English composer, Ralph Vaughan Williams, in the 20th century. Vaughan Williams heard the melody being sung near Sussex in the UK and this is where the carol derives its name. This beloved arrangement was made by David Willcocks for the Choir of King's College, Cambridge.

'The Silver Stars are in the Sky' – W.G. James (1892-1977)

Over in Lonsdale Street, during the 1930s, the organist and choir master of Melbourne's Wesley Church wrote several sets of Australian Carols, avoiding references to snow and winter and instead focusing on Christmas as it is experienced in the southern hemisphere. 'The Silver Stars are in the sky' is one of the best known of these, along with 'The north wind is tossing the leaves.'

- Alexandre Guilmant (1837-1911)

The French organist and composer Alexandre Guilmant published several volumes of 'Noels' for the organ for use at Christmas time. This work is a setting of the much-loved traditional Polish carol. Rhys Boak (Organ)
