December from 'The Seasons' – Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840-1893)

The celebrated Russian composer Pyoty Tchaikovsky composed a set of piano works, one for each month of the year, for the St. Petersburg music magazine. A new piece would appear with each issue of the magazine from December 1875 to the November of 1876. Elyane will perform the entire work for us in instalments throughout this year.
